A lyric poet of the 5th c. BCE from Sicyon.

κάλλιστον μὲν ἐγὼ λείπω φάος ἠελίοιο, δεύτερον ἄστρα φαεινὰ σεληναίης τε πρόσωπον ἠδὲ καὶ ὡραίους σικύους καὶ μῆλα καὶ ὄγχνας[.]

The dying Adonis laments the things he will miss. The poem survives because Zenobius (2^{nd} c. C.E.) quotes it in explaining the proverb, ἠλιθιώτερος τοῦ Πραξίλλης Αδώνιδος (4.21). The poem was famous for its supposed bathos: "more vapid than Praxilla's Adonis" became proverbial. But one person's bathos is another's pathos. Individual details of everyday life make popular songs appealing.
